Better with Age

During the past few years, there have been times when people have felt isolated and alone. This has mental health

consequences for many, but there were some groups that were more affected than others. One of those groups was seniors (age 55+).

A professor of medicine at the University of California stated, "after the pandemic hit, some seniors felt a dramatic worsening of loneliness and mental health problems such as anxiety and depression."

In response to this issue, the library has created a program where seniors can gather, hear speakers, play games,

and make connections with others. "Better with Age" takes place on the third Friday of the month at 10 a.m. The initial get-together takes place on January 20. Participants are treated to refreshments.

The first meeting was designed to allow for introductions, playing games, and to discuss what they would like to see for the future of the program.



If you have stopped by the library within the last few months, you may have noticed that our Graphic Novel section now resides across from the DVDs and young adult novels. This is to ensure space for growth in this collection.

Graphic novels are vastly more than "easy reads." Many times, these stories are filled to the brim with complex characters and topics, gorgeous

illustrations and a wide variety of art styles. Perfect for reluctant readers who are slow to start on their love of books, graphic novels open the door to literacy and a lifelong love of reading.

Books to be discussed are available at the library. Stop in today.


Looking for Something to Read? Try These Books.

When my family and friends gathered for the holidays, someone inevitably asked, "So, what are you reading?" Answers varied as widely as everyone's hometowns.

Carol, who's from Missouri, recommended Four Winds by Kristin Hannah, the bestselling author of The Nightingale and The Great Alone. This novel is set during the Great Depression. The central character, a single mother, is a testament to hope, resilience, and the strength of the human spirit to survive adversity.





Ben, in Berks County PA, just finished Michael Connelly's latest police procedural and runaway best seller, *Desert Star*. The protagonist, Harry Bosch, is a retired detective who solves cold cases. The character is so popular that he has his own Wikipedia page and TV series, appropriately


titled "Bosch." Connelly's stories are gripping, often based on actual criminal files.

Katie, who lives near Houston, said she likes reading series, too. She's pre-ordered number 11 in the Flavia Albia mysteries, written by British author Lindsey Davis, due out next summer. In *Fatal Legacy*, Flavia is a private informer in ancient Rome, investigating murder and intrigue. The rich



period detail makes these stories informative as well as fun.

Leah, in St. John's, Newfoundland, talked about *The Day the World Came to Town* by Jim DeFede, a true story set in a small town in Newfoundland, Canada. When 38 jetliners were forced to land at Gander International Airport by the closing of U.S. airspace on September 11, the people of Gander generously welcomed the stranded



passengers. They are an inspiring example for us all.


Nancy, in Michigan, is a fan of historical fiction. Her



latest is *Gilded Mountain* by Kate Manning. The novel takes place in the early 1900s in a Colorado marble-mining town. Characters depict the poorest immigrant families and the wealthiest business owners; descriptions of their vastly different lives explain the origins of the labor union movement.

My own answer to "What are you reading" is West with Giraffes by Lynda Rutledge. Set in 1938 and based on a true

story, its narrator is a young orphan who's hired to help take two giraffes across the country from New York to their new home in the San Diego Zoo. The book explores what it means to be changed by the grace of animals and the kindness of strangers.

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
